Food that provides lots of energy for a happy active family tops the list of recipes used by Mrs. Kenneth Judd, 4139 W. 173rd St.

Being president of the Perry PTA is a time consuming job but a very rewarding one, Mrs. Judd says. She does a lot of entertaining and loves it. Although leading a very busy life, Mrs. Judd who has a BS degree in education from USC, finds time for relaxation which includes cake decorating and making ceramics.

Mr. Judd is assistant plant superintendent for the Engine Rebuilding Corp. In his limited amount of spare time he enjoys playing bridge, fishing and is an ardent baseball fan. He also has a mammoth record collection.

For a healthy wholesome meal Mrs. Judd today contributes her recipe for a Kidney Bean and Meat Ball recipe which she serves with a tossed green salad with sour cream and French garlic bread.

KIDNEY BEAN AND MEAT BALL CASSEROLE
 Milk—½ cup
 Soft bread crumbs—1 cup
 Salt—1 teaspoon
 Pepper—½ teaspoon
 Chili powder—½ teaspoon
 Sweet peppers—3 red or green
 Onions (sliced)—2 cups
 Salad oil or melted fat—

5 tablespoons
 Salt—½ teaspoon
 Tomato sauce...2 8-ounce cans
 Red Kidney beans—3 No. 2 cans (7½ cups)
 Cheese (sharp Cheddar)—½ lb.

Combine milk, bread crumbs, salt, pepper and chili powder—add ground meat and mix well. Keep in refrigerator for later use. Wash peppers, cut in 6 sections, remove seeds. Peel and slice onions. Now form meat mixture into small balls and brown on all sides 5 or 6 minutes. Remove from skillet. Cook onions in same skillet with ½ teaspoon salt until soft. Add tomato sauce and peppers. Let simmer 8 to 10 minutes—stir occasionally. Drain kidney beans and put into shallow 4 quart casserole. (I usually use 2 2-quart casseroles and put one in freezer for later use). Cut cheese into ½ inch cubes, add tomato mixture. Stir well—spoon over beans in casserole. Add border of meat balls. Bake in 350 degree oven for 40 to 45 minutes.

Dr. J. Canby To Speak at YWCA, Nov. 1

"Religion, Revolution, and Reform" will be the topic of a lecture and discussion by Dr. Joel S. Canby, anthropologist, when he speaks at the Torrance Branch, YWCA, on Friday, Nov. 1, 8 p.m. The event is sponsored by the Public Affairs Committee of the Torrance YWCA of which Mrs. F. R. Monroe is Chairman.

Dr. Canby received his Ph. D. in Anthropology from Harvard University. He has been Director of the Center for Advanced Anthropological Studies in Guatemala, C. A. In addition he spent four years in Iraq where he was Chairman of the Department of Social Relations, advisor to the Minister of Social Affairs on Rural Development, and did research among the Bedouins and Kurds. He has traveled extensively through Europe, the Middle East, and the Orient.

Dr. Canby was recently Professor of Anthropology and Coordinator of the Behavioral Sciences at the State University of New York and is currently engaged in writing a book on the social history of the Middle East.

The lecture will deal with the importance of religion in promoting a community of man and attempt to lead to discussion of the impact of atheistic communism on the modern world.
