

TRUCKERS DENOUNCE MONOPOLY

A city-granted "monopoly" to a paving company for removal of dirt at the city dump has hurt small truck operators. A. D. Palmeri told the Torrance City Council Tuesday night.

Palmeri, spokesman for a group of operators of dump trucks, said he and the others had been barred from removing soil and sand from the municipal refuse pit near Madrona Ave. and Spencer St.

City Manager George Stevens confirmed the paving company had been given exclusive right to remove dirt from the site, but said the agreement was made only after "we were deserted" by the operators.

Carolyn Stroth, former Torrance resident and sister of former Police Chief John Stroth, died in Loveland, Colo., it was learned here yesterday.


