Micohi Harriers Win

Powerful Mira Costa retained their longstanding record of never losing to a Torrance High crosscountry team Friday when the Mustangs humbled the Tartars and Santa Monica in a triangular meet on Micohi's rugged course.
John Peterson toured the rugged 1.8 mile course in a speedy 9:42, to set a new record, 19 seconds trimmed off the old mark, in leading the defending CIF champions to a 25-44-68 win.
Torrance's Len Ehlers also

broke the old course record while finishing second with a 9:51 clocking.

It was the first loss of the season for Coach Jim Wilson's harriers who were previously rated as best bets to capture the Bay League crown that the Mustangs have held for three straight years.

Other varsity point earners for THIS were Dennis Hansen, 5th, who came in with a 10:03 time; San'fred Smith, 10th; Tom Carter, 13th; Joe Gilstrap, 16th; Terry Murphy, 17th; and Dick Ryon, 18th.

Tarbabes Lose 19-13 Thriller To Leuzinger



North Eleven Drops Tilt by 19-7 Decision

Coach Howard Johnson and his invading Monarchs piled up their third Pioneer League win Friday night as they defeated the Saxons of North High, 19-7, before a Homecoming crowd of 3000 at the Torrance High stadium.
The loss gives the Saxons a league total of one win to three losses.

Things started off with a bang when North High kicked off. The Monarchs fumbled the ball on their own 49-yard line and North High recovered. The Morningside delegation intercepted a quick lateral soon after.

The ball remained in the center of the field until the last few minutes of the first period when Morningside took the ball on their own 26-yard line. On the first play of the second quarter Larry Ballet completed a pass to Fred Davis who galloped down the field for 74 yards and a touchdown. Glen Kezer's kick was wide and the Monarchs led, 6-0.

Monarchs Fumble
Late in the third period, Morningside again fumbled. This time deep behind the line of scrimmage and Staf Flitenger recovered on the visitors' four-yard line.

A handoff to Ernie Thomsen failed to move the Saxons closer and a five-yard penalty put the pigskin on the Monarch nine. A third down pass into the end zone was intercepted to end local hopes of a quick td.

Taking over on their own 20-yard line, the Monarchs gained 54 yards rushing and, with the assistance of a 15-yard penalty against the Saxons, Glen Kezer again went over for the score. The conversion was good, putting the score at 13-0.

North High's contingent got into the scoring act on the next series of plays with Jim Whitley passing to Bill Claxton in the end zone.

The conversion was good—giving the locals their only score.

The third Morningside t.d. came on the heels of a bad kickoff by North High. George Hansford took the ball on the 45 and when the smoke cleared he was standing in the end zone chalking up another six points for the final score of the game.

Williams ran right end to the one yard line and two plays later put the ball across the scoring line. At half-time, Warriors led 18-0.

The final six points were tallied when the Warriors went 60 yards in five plays. A 37-yard pass from Williams to Barber was the trick that turned the score card.

Matthews Tops Bowling Field With Flourish



Crusaders Make it 21 Straight By Downing San Bernardino 21-0

The Crusaders are now undefeated in 21 straight games. The Big Red and White added another victory to their list last Sunday on the rain-soaked San Bernardino High School field before a crowd of 500 cheering fans, unleashing a sparkling passing attack to whip the San Berdoos, 21-0.

A first period fumble recovery set up the first Crusader t.d. Tim Roettger dashed 10 yards for the score with John McCann adding the conversion. Two pass completions—by Dave Gardner, one to Richie O'Neil and one to Bryan Peterson set up a second period two-yard t.d. dive by McCann, the powerful Crusader fullback.

Early in the fourth quarter Phil Dowsing, big Crusader right end, made a brilliant leaping catch for the third Crusader score. Roettger added the extra point.

On the last play of the game Dowsing made a circus catch of a pass from Roettger which covered 45 yards and raced all the way to the Cub one-foot line as the gun sounded ending the game.

Coaches Jim Fohey and Tom Robinson had high praise for the strong defensive team of the Crusaders which has yielded only 12 points while the offense has piled up 125 points. "Everyone knows the boys who score the points—Roettger, McCann, Dowsing, etc.—but few have heard of the boys who have done such a great job in holding our opponents to only two touchdowns. The names Tony Lizza, Dave Olson, Lindsay Hughes, Pat Karnes, Forrest Wermuth, Fred Zuber, Dave Gardner, 'Moose' Pritchard and also Tim Roettger will long be remembered by Coach Robinson and myself," said Coach Fohey after the San Bernardino victory.

Awards will be given in the form of team trophies for the first and second place teams and also individual trophies to members of the first and second place teams. All persons interested should contact Harbor Sports Office.




