However, the Vikings are the top offensive team in the loop with two of the circuit's best backs in A. J. Bailey and Perry Bates, plus glue-fingered End Ted Aembrister.

Last week in rolling over Leuzinger, 19-6, the Tartars displayed their most impressive offensive showing of the season, with Bobby Grajeda and Roger Reed at their best, and Quarterback Ron Veres completing seven of 10 aerial attempts to offer THS rooters a new brand of offense.

Tomorrow night's ruckus promises to be the game of the season with both teams using the look-in pass and quick openers to perfection.

Top offensive and defensive football will be played at its best, with most observers feeling that the line play of the two teams will decide the winner and 1957 Bay League champions.


