## Unemployment, Employment Up From Last Year

Employment in California declined more than seasonally in October and unemployment registered a September-to-October increase for the first time since the postwar layoffs of 1945, according to two state agencies.

Ernest B. Webb, director of industrial relations, reported that employment dropped 67,000 from September to an October total of 5,767,000. This represented the largest September-to-October loss in nine years.

Figures Up  
H. W. Stewart, director of employment, announced that unemployment of 175,000 was up by 12,000 over the month—the first October increase in unemployment since the adjustments that followed World War II. The number of unemployed this October was 62,000 greater than a year ago.

The two officials attributed the large October drop in employment and the increase in unemployment primarily to early layoffs following peak canning activities, continued cutbacks in aircraft and other defense-connected industries, and to less than the usual October hiring in trade.

More Employed  
In discussing employment Webb pointed out that, despite the drop from September, more people were at work in California last month than in any previous October. Employment was 52,000 higher than a year ago. This year-over-year margin, however, was the lowest for any month in three years, and compares with spreads of about 200,000 to 300,000 during most of 1955 and 1956. Increases in most industry groups were partly offset by declines from October, 1956, of 26,000 in construction employment, 13,000 in manufacturing, and 7,000 in agriculture.

The labor force, including the employed and those available and seeking work, totaled 5,942,000 in October compared with 5,997,000 in September, and 5,828,000 a year ago.

Unemployment represented 2.9 per cent of the labor force this October, contrasted with 1.9 per cent in October last year.
