



Suit Against City Delayed

The suit of the Don-Ja-Ran Corp. against the city of Torrance in connection with disputes over the beach zoning has been continued until Jan. 22.

The action was filed in Los Angeles Superior Court and seeks to nullify the decision of the City Council changing the land use from multiple family use to single-family use.

The Council revoked the zoning because of its ire over the plans of Don-Ja-Ran to build a motel on the site. Previously, the Councilmen claimed, they had approved a resort-type hotel. The firm said it could not get financing for the larger undertaking, and termed the action illegal.

College Vets Reveal Plans For Memorial

Christmas came early this year to the Junipero Serra Home for Boys, when members of Chi Gamma Iota, El Camino College veterans' organization, presented the home 10 memberships to the YMCA.

Accepting the gift for the home was Joe Thesing, who addressed the fraternity and its guests, describing the functions of the Gardena youth center and lauding the Chi Gamma Iota membership for its interest in local youth.

In addition to the Y memberships, the club announced its plans to contribute a war memorial to those of El Camino College who died "for the freedom in which we believe."

Vice president Carl Tate made the latter presentation to President Forrest G. Murdoch of the college. The memorial, Tate said, will be located on campus in conformance with the wishes of the college architect.

Inscription Told
The sundial, Tate said, will be inscribed with the following words: "This sundial is dedicated in memoriam to those from El Camino who died in the Korean War, while fighting for the principles in which we believe."
"O quiet form upon the dust, I cannot look and yet I must. If these great patient dyings—all these agonies and wound-bearings and bloodshed can teach us how to live, these dyings were not wasted... Marie Moore."

"Presented to El Camino College by Chi Gamma Iota, Veterans' Service Organization, 1957-58."
President Doug Caves, Vice President Carl Tate, and other officers in the 150-member vets' group are Rich Salmonson, secretary; Eddie Conn, treasurer; Tom Carney, historian; and Jerry Blankenship, sergeant at arms.

Adult School Will Resume Again Jan. 6

Classes for adults in the Torrance Evening High School will resume after the holidays on Monday evening, Jan. 6.

Although the new semester does not begin until Feb. 3, new students may enroll in most classes at this time. Also welcome are former students who wish to brush-up on old skills or acquire new skills.

There are openings in both shorthand and typing classes. The late afternoon typing class will include instruction in cutting stencils, using the mimeograph, dictaphone, and 10-key adding machines. Typing and shorthand tests are given each evening which will aid those working toward civil service promotions.

Other classes in which new or former students may enroll include machine shop, woodshop, blueprint and drafting, cake decorating, dressmaking, psychology, public speaking, mathematics, English, elementary reading, English for the foreign born, ceramics, lampshade making, development of personality and appearance, and parent participation classes in child observation and co-operative nursery.

Richards to Seek Second Senate Term

State Senator Richard Richards, (D) Los Angeles, announced Friday he will be a candidate for re-election to his present office.

He said he is convinced that "the mature decision for myself is to remain with the job I have, completing the vital tasks I have at hand, so long as this greatest of all metropolitan communities indicates a willingness that I do so."

The 38th senatorial district, which Richards has represented since 1955, comprises all of Los Angeles County and is by far the largest and most complex of all the districts represented in the State Senate.

Richards is vice chairman of the 18-member Joint Committee on Water Resources Development problems which is now seeking to iron out north-south conflicts clearing the way for agreement on a statewide water program.

He is also chairman of the Senate Interim Committee on Metropolitan Areas, which is charged with examining the functions and problems of local government, is vice chairman of the powerful Senate Transportation Committee, and chairman of a special Subcommittee on Rapid Transit.
