Catalina Ave., Redondo Beach, will hold a monthly Family night worship service tomorrow night at 8:30 p.m. The service will honor all the members of the congregation who have birthdays or anniversaries during the month of December. A special blessing will be given by Rabbi Henri E. Front, spiritual leader of Temple Menorah. Dr. Matthew J. Ellenhorn, president of the congregation, will present those being honored with a book mark containing an appropriate verse from the Bible.

Books Emphasized

This presentation will be symbolic of Temple Menorah's emphasis this month on Jewish books. During the month the nation's Jewry have been celebrating "Jewish Book Month." Jewish people have been urged to buy books of Jewish history, customs and ceremonies, philosophy and theology in an effort at furthering their knowledge and devotion to Judaism and to God. Many of the books which are most popular will be on sale at the Sisterhood gift shop at the temple before the service begins.

Sermon Set

A special sermon on Jewish literature will be given by Rabbi Front. 'CHRISTIAN SCIENCE' IS TOPIC

"Blessed be the name of God for ever and ever: for wisdom and might are his: . . . he revealeth the deep and secret things," reads the Golden Text from Daniel (2:20, 22) for the Lesson-Sermon "Christian Science" which will be read in all Churches of Christ, Scientist, on Sunday.

The words of Paul to his beloved and faithful co-worker, Timothy, are used in the sermon where Paul writes, "All scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness: That the man of God may be perfect, throughly furnished unto all good works" (II Tim. 3:16, 17).

Of the spiritual inspiration which led her to found her church on the Bible and to write of the revelation which came to her, Mary Baker Eddy says in a correlative passage from "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," "I knew the Principle of all harmonious Mind-action to be God, and that cures were produced in primitive Christian healing by holy, uplifting faith; but I must know the Science of this healing, and I won my way to absolute conclusions through divine revelation, reason, and demonstration" (p. 109).

Name Thomas To New Job

Recently appointed circuit minister of Jehovah's Witnesses, William R. Thomas of 311 Beryl St., Redondo Beach, has also accepted a post at their Washington High School circuit assembly this week.

As circuit minister, Thomas serves some 20 congregations every six months. Included in his itinerary are the cities of Torrance, Hawthorne, Wilmington, San Pedro, Redondo Beach, and Los Angeles.

Born in Lafayette, Ill., he is one of 10 children, two of whom are ministers of the Watchtower Society. Thomas has served as presiding minister in several eastern cities and has participated in all major conventions of Jehovah's Witnesses since 1940.

He has been associated with Jehovah's Witnesses for the past 17 years, having attended the Watchtower Bible School of Gilead. An extensive traveler in the United States, Thomas has lectured to convention audiences in Chicago, Louisville, Long Beach, and Los Angeles.

"Qualified to Teach" is the theme chosen for the joint assembly, and, according to Thomas, he will offer Scriptural evidence as to the channel now used for the dissemination of Bible truths, by speaking on the subject at 5 p.m., "Show Respect for Jehovah's Organization."

Many delegates from Torrance and 19 other congregations will be represented at the conclave at Washington High School Auditorium, 108th and Denker St., Los Angeles, with an expected peak of 2200 persons at 3 p.m., Sunday, when Bruce E. Griffin, traveling representative from Texas, delivers the free public lecture, "What Are the Prospects for Lasting Peace?"
