

Torrance Draws Morningside in Beverly Tourney

One of Southern California's outstanding high school Athletic events, the Beverly Hills Invitational Basketball Tournament, will get underway Wednesday afternoon, Jan. 7, with the first tip-off scheduled for 12 noon, Wednesday, Jan. 7, North will meet Anaheim at 7 p. m. Wednesday.

Trophies will be awarded to the first five places of the

championship bracket, with an award going to the winner of the consolation contest. An award will also be granted to the tournament's outstanding player, while individual plaques will be given to the first and second All-Tournament teams.

"The student body, faculty, and administrators of the Beverly Hills High School look

forward each year to welcoming the players, their families, and supporting student bodies to the tournament," Kenneth L. Peters, principal of Beverly Hills High School, declares.

The program will run four days and nights, with the final championships starting at 8:30 p. m., Saturday, Jan. 10. Tickets for preliminary games Wednesday

and Thursday will be 60 cents and semi-final and final tilts Friday and Saturday will be \$1. There will also be an adult all-tournament ticket selling for \$1.50 which will entitle the holder to the full 32 games. These admission tickets may be purchased either at the participating high schools or at the tournament ticket office at the entrance of the Beverly Hills High School Swim-Gym.

The Invitational Basketball Tournament staff includes Peters, Athletic Control Chairman Steve T. Milech, Administrative Assistant H. John Marrow, Director of Athletics Walter Puffer, and Basketball Coach Charles Reilly.



Retail Grocery Clerks In This Area NOT ON STRIKE!

HERE IS THE OFFICIAL NOTICE TO ALL EMPLOYERS BY TELEGRAM FROM LOCAL 905 TO ALL FOOD EMPLOYERS:

For the sake of saving time, convenience and the interest of economy, the several Southern California Retail Clerks Union Locals have been attempting to negotiate jointly with the representatives of your industry. However, you must fully understand that, in these negotiations, the representatives of Local 905 have been negotiating solely on behalf of the membership of this Union Local. In the past weeks, there have been reports of threats made that on January 1, 1959, that in the event of economic action by any other Retail Clerks Union Local, the industry intends to shut down all food markets in the jurisdictional area of Local 905, and to lock out the members of this Local Union in retaliation against such economic action by one or more other Locals.

Local 905 desires to make absolutely clear that the decision to take economic action is a decision which can be made by the separate memberships of each local union involved in these negotiations and is the responsibility of each such Local Union.

We wish to advise each market operator that it is the intention of the members of Local 905 to continue negotiations with the industry upon the terms of a new contract and, pending the ultimate outcome of such negotiations to continue their regular employment without strike or other economic action, provided that the industry bargains in good faith and provided that reasonable progress is made.

Under these circumstances, any attempt on the part of the industry to shut down operations and to lock out the members of this Local Union within its jurisdictional area will, we believe, be an unlawful breach of the industry's duty to bargain in good faith, as well as a violation of the National Labor Relations Act (Taft-Hartley), and will be an unwarranted and unjustifiable economic blow to the community in which we live.
