Approve Site Of Proposed Junior High

Acquisition of a junior high school site in the Harbor area was approved by the Los Angeles City Board of Education Monday, according to Superintendent of Schools Ellis A. Jarvis.

A 2 1/2 acre site located 500 feet west of Western Ave. and two blocks south of Green Hills Memorial Park will be purchased from Harry and Dorothy Kissel for construction of the Rudecinda Dodson Junior High School.

The total price includes \$268,762 for the cost of the land, \$65,375.55 for grading of the site, and \$65,757.94 for construction of streets and curbs.
