**ORDINANCE NO. 1066**  
 AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE DECLARING THE CONSTRUCTION, ERECTION OR ALTERATIONS OF BUILDINGS OR STRUCTURES IN THE AREA SERVED BY NARBONNE RANCH WATER COMPANY NO. 2 AND NARBONNE RANCH WATER COMPANY NO. 3 TO BE A MENACE TO HEALTH, SAFETY AND WELFARE AND PROHIBITING THE ISSUANCE OF BUILDING PERMITS FOR CONSTRUCTION THEREIN, AND DECLARING THE PRESENCE OF AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, on December 16, 1958, the City Council of the City of Torrance instructed the Superintendent of Building not to issue any more building permits in the area in the City of Torrance served by the Narbonne Ranch Water Company No. 2 and the Narbonne Ranch Water Company No. 3 because of extremely low water pressure in said area; and

WHEREAS, said City Council, after notice by publication, held a public hearing on January 27, 1959, for the purpose of determining whether or not the area served by said two water companies should be declared a hazard area and building therein prohibited entirely or except under certain conditions, which hearing was continued to February 10, 1959; and

WHEREAS, said City Council, as a result of such hearing and of information otherwise obtained, finds and determines as follows:

That the area served by the Narbonne Ranch Water Company No. 2 and the Narbonne Ranch Water Company No. 3 in the City of Torrance is bounded as follows:

Beginning at the intersection of the centerlines of Crenshaw Boulevard and Sepulveda Boulevard as same existed on February 16, 1959, thence easterly along the centerline of said Sepulveda Boulevard to its intersection with the centerline of Arlington Avenue as same existed on February 16, 1959; thence southerly along the centerline of said Arlington Avenue to its intersection with the westerly prolongation of the southerly boundary of Ketter Estate property as shown on map of Tract No. 14016, recorded in Book 302, pages 7 to 11 inclusive, on file in the office of the County Recorder of Los Angeles County; thence easterly along said prolongation and the said southerly boundary to its intersection with the centerline of Walnut Street; thence southerly along said centerline of Walnut Street to its intersection with the southerly boundary of the City of Torrance; thence westerly, southerly and westerly to its intersection with the centerline of aforementioned Crenshaw Boulevard; thence northerly along the centerline of said Crenshaw Boulevard to the point of beginning.

That no other water company serves water in or to said area, except certain portions thereof served by the Water Department of the City of Torrance wherein adequate pressure is provided.

That the water pressure is so low and the water volume so small in the area as to be inadequate for the proper functioning of plumbing fixtures, the extinguishment of fires, and is otherwise insufficient to supply adequately, dependably or safely the total water requirements of all consumers therein under conditions of normal consumption.

That an increase in the construction, erection or alteration of buildings and structures in said area will increase the inadequacy of the water supply existing as well as future buildings and structures.


