BEST BUYS FOR THE WEEK

In Torrance Markets

This is egg month . . . and April and May may be egg months too. Not a better time to take advantage of peak production.

If you are in the habit of buying medium size eggs, cast your eye at large. Fresh production of large sizes makes them the outstanding best buy. If in doubt about the best egg size to buy, here's an easy rule:

Divide the price per dozen by the number of ounces.

Large eggs .24 oz. per dozen
Medium " .21 oz. per dozen
Small " .18 oz. per dozen

The cartons state egg quality by designating the grade. The finest quality are grades AA and A. Each egg is graded by an expert who determines the quality inside the shell by holding the egg before a strong light in a darkened room. What do we see when we break eggs from a carton labeled Grade A or AA? A small air cell, a well-centered yolk, and a large proportion of thick white.

When you select meat or poultry this week you'll have unlimited choice . . . perhaps controlled only by your purse strings. There is plenty of beef, lamb and pork. Fresh fish supplies fluctuate with catches, but we have dependable sources of frozen and canned.

FACT OR FALLACY?

FALLACY. Grade AA eggs are always large eggs. Grade A are smaller size.

FACT. Grade of egg refers only to inside quality of the eggs. Each of the grades may be large, medium or small. Size refers only to the weight of each dozen eggs and has nothing to do with grade or quality.
