Pat Venable, 5419 Sharynne Lane, Torrance, signed today to be a co-driver in the 1959 Mobilgas Economy Run, announced the United States Auto Club, which governs the contest.

Miss Venable will co-drive a Chevrolet Biscayne in the 2000-mile trek from Los Angeles to Kansas City, Missouri, April 5 through 9.

This year's run boasts the biggest field of entrants in the history of the 23 year old stock car classic. More than 45 cars, representing every make of American auto, will compete.

As co-driver Miss Venable must be the brains for the actual driver. The co-driver computes the speeds and times that must be maintained over the legs of the course, figures gas consumption, and keeps the driver informed as to road conditions that lay ahead.

Accurate plotting of the course will be of utmost importance in the Run this year; because the winners of the six car classes will be determined in actual miles-per-gallon. Formerly, winners were figured in ton-miles.
