Columbia School Opened To Handicapped Students

Nearly 80 severely mentally retarded children moved into a new school Monday, as Columbia School, 4502 W. 186th St., opened its doors for the first time.

The new facility is specially designed for education of mentally retarded children, with two classrooms each for kindergarten, primary, intermediate, and upper grade students, as well as a miniature "home" in which the children learn how to do simple tasks. Also included in the school are administration and cafeteria buildings.

HALF OF the school's \$280,000 cost will be borne by the state, which also provides additional operating funds for its budget. Children from Torrance, Lawndale, Lennox, Inglewood, Hawthorne, Wiseburn and Centinela Valley School Districts will attend classes there.

Under the Southwest Cooperative program, the seven districts cooperate in providing schooling for children with different kinds of handicaps.

PRINCIPAL Lester Foster heads a staff of seven teachers, a clerk, and custodian at the school, which formerly was housed on the Meadow Park School site. All teachers have

C of C Opposes Development Legislation

The board of directors of the Torrance Chamber of Commerce this week took a strong stand against two area development bills—one national and one state—according to Legislative Chairman John Wallace.

California Senate Bill 43, relating to establishment of an Economic Development Agency, and U. S. Senate Bill 722, calling for backing the same program under guise of assisting depressed areas, were the bills opposed.

President Fred W. Mill said California has progressed far ahead of any other state in the union and that his Board sees no need for "an additional governmental agency to bleed the taxpayer."

Wallace, in correspondence to legislator, pointed out the tremendous successful industrial development program of Torrance without the help of any governmental agency.

Agajanian is offering against 40% of the gate for the seven-event program at the 183rd and Vermont Avenue 880 include Johnnie Parsons, 1950 "500" victor; Shorty Templeman, three-time National midget champion; Johnnie Tolan, 1952 National midget king; Earl Motter, current National midget point leader; Ray Crawford, 1954 Mexican Road Race winner; Don Edmunds, 1957 Indy "Rookie of the Year"; Danny Oakes, Bill Boyd, Jimmy Davies, Dempsey Wilson and Bill Homeier.

High School students Robert W. McKnight and Clarence Fuzak of Torrance will represent the local school district at a community career conference to be held at the Town and Gown Foyer of USC at luncheon next Thursday.

Intended as a new approach to the problem of introducing high school talent to the requirements of a variety of vocations, the event is being sponsored by SC and the Industry-Education Council.

"We believe the plan will encourage the exchange of ideas between the groups interested in employing talented graduates," said Dr. L. C. van Atta, head of educational and technical information at Hughes Aircraft Co., who will address the SC luncheon.

Each of twelve tables will be presided over by an authority from industry or a profession representing such fields as chemistry, engineering, law, physics, mathematics, teaching, medicine, business, and accounting. Guests will include two high school students and their teachers and advisers, together with an SC faculty member and student.
