'Flying Saucers' Yummy Favorite With Students

High school youngsters in Torrance are really hep to the Space Age, and they love the chewy "Flying Saucer" cookies.

FLYING SAUCERS (A Chewy Cookie)

- 1 1/2 cups shortening 1/2 tsp. Baking Soda
2 1/4 cups sugar 1 tsp. cinnamon
2 eggs 1 tsp. allspice
1/2 cup Honey 1 1/4 tsp. salt
1/4 cup milk 1/2 cup raisins
3 cups all purpose flour 3 cups rolled Oats (sifted)

Cream sugar and shortening thoroughly. Beat in eggs. Add honey and blend well. Sift flour with spices, baking soda and salt.

Scoop out about 1/2 cup of batter for each cookie on a lightly oiled cookie sheet, allowing about 4 inches between cookies for spreading.
