After serving as medical officer in the U. S. Air Force from 1951 to 1953, Dr. Weiss

practiced pediatrics and later held a residency in allergy at the University of Wisconsin Hospital.

ing at their doors. Our problem as legislators is to make certain that we plan far enough ahead so that we will have financing enough and time enough to provide the facilities when they are most needed.

MANY AREAS of the state, conscious of the fact that not much time exists to meet their needs for collegiate level facilities, have already obtained legislative approval of state colleges or University branches within their boundaries. Others are even now advancing their claims for consideration before our current session.

The importance of the problem is multiplied by the stringent fiscal position in which our state now finds itself. It is a fact that cannot be ignored that we do not have enough resources to meet all the demands for collegiate facilities which are being made. Therefore, as legislators, we must get a comprehensive picture of the needs of the entire state in order to make available resources serve the greatest good of the greatest number.

ANOTHER fact which the legislature must bear in mind is that public higher education in California is not under a unified administration. Under the Constitution, the University in a separate branch of state government, and is governed by its Regents. The state colleges, originally only teacher training institutions, are administered by the state board of education. Public junior colleges are operated either by separate school districts or by larger city districts. A sizeable degree of coordination between all three agencies is needed to work out the best and most economical solution to our problem or more collegiate facilities.

Recently, our Senate Committee on Education considered and approved in principle a resolution adopted by the University Regents which shows promise of helping the situation. In effect, it calls for early purchase of sites for state colleges or new branches of the University which have already been approved by the Legislature, and their early construction under a system of priority of need. It then calls for a halt on approval of any additional institutions until the part to be taken by junior colleges in meeting the total need can be evaluated, and adequate plans for using them as much as possible are put into effect.

Such a resolution, if properly carried out, could do much to help relieve pressures in a sensitive area while at the same time enabling us to make the best possible use of all available resources in meeting our need for more higher education facilities.
