Asks Loop To Approve Rule Change

High school grid stars planning to enroll at El Camino College this fall will be in for a pleasant surprise if plans advocated by ECC Coach Norm Verry materialize.

Verry, along with Metropolitan Conference football coaches from Long Beach and Santa Monica, are currently spearheading a campaign to modify NCAA rules to return free substitution to junior college football. "Goal posts will remain the same, however," Verry noted revealing his plan.

THE RETURN to play on a free substitution basis would enable youngsters graduating from local high schools to play on the junior college level under the rules to which they are accustomed.

In many instances this will mean the continuation of football play, where existing rules have made it virtually impossible for good gridgers who have specialized in either defensive or offensive play to continue in the game.

Verry and the block of Metro Conference coaches have already made their recommendation to the State Junior College Athletic Commission for state-wide approval. "It is virtually certain," the El Camino coach noted, "that the Metropolitan Conference will adopt our plan, whether the State goes along with it or not."

LOCAL HIGH school gridgers and their coaches will receive first hand information on the proposed changes on May 20, when El Camino sponsors a Sports Night for neighboring high school athletes. Starting at 7:30 p.m., the program will be held in the Campus Theater.

Appearing before the guests will be Jim Sears, an ECC alum who is now serving as backfield coach at the University of Southern California, and Bill Barnes, head coach of the UCLA Bruins.

THE VISITING coaches will explain that their teams are largely dependent upon junior college transfers for their playing talent.

Host coaches will outline registration and eligibility procedures of El Camino College before opening the college pools to their guests for a swimming party.

Advanced First Aid Class Begins On Wednesday
