

## Veteran Message Sender to Retire

After more than 40 years of seeing that the message got through, George A. Hall, 22216 Redbeam Ave., is going to retire tomorrow and work on another kind of message.

The Torrance resident will leave his post as deputy chief of the operations branch of the Air Traffic Control Division of the Civil Aeronautics Administration, climaxing a career of government service that began in 1918.

Started at 15 Ever since he started as a railroad telegraph operator with the old "Frisco" line at the age of 15, Hall has been directly or indirectly concerned with seeing that messages went through.

When he retires tomorrow, he plans to "take it easy" and work another message—writing a book. Long a student of Civil War and Indian War history, he plans to try his hand at writing fiction about the period.

A native of Fontana, Kans., where his father was a railroad telegrapher, Hall himself started in the same work when he was only 15. He got another "message" however, and joined the Navy in 1918, starting a long government career.

Served in Navy He spent three separate tours of duty with the Navy, serving in the Philippine Islands and aboard the world's first aircraft carrier, the USS Langley. He was discharged in 1920, although his service was broken by brief civilian respites as a telegrapher for the Frisco Railroad and the Postal Telegraph Co.

Hall started out with the predecessor to the CAA in 1930 and served in various capacities and served in the first west coast teletype message center in Los Angeles. He moved to Fresno, Daggett, San Diego, and San Francisco as a senior operator and later assistant chief of the CAA overseas station. He helped establish the CAA training center in Santa Monica, later becoming chief.

In 1955, he became regional communications inspector, and in 1951, became chief of the CAA program requirements branch. When the CAA was re-

organized, Hall became deputy chief of the operations branch.

Hall Advances From the early days in which he was directly concerned with sending the message, Hall advanced to supervision to seeing that messages for the safe operation of planes throughout that messages got through to guide airplanes safely to their destinations.

Mrs. Hall was the daughter of an old friend of his father's. "When I went away to the service, she was just a little schoolgirl, but when I came back, she had grown into quite a woman," he declared.

The Halls have one son, living in Culver City. They have lived here since 1953.

## Telephone Expansion Plans Told

An allocation of nearly \$11.5 million for improvements in the Redondo, Palos Verdes and Rolling Hills central exchanges of the General Telephone Co., during the next two years has been announced by H. C. Vaupel, manager of the Frontier number area for the company. Budget for 1958 is \$6,407,000 Vaupel said, while the 1959 budget allocates \$5,057,000 for the area.

Largest single item in the budget this year is \$2,874,000 for central office automatic switching equipment in Redondo, he reported.

New automatic ticketing equipment is scheduled to go into operation next April, accounting for much of the equipment expenditure.

A new one-story and partial addition to the existing central facilities of Rolling Hills is planned, and automatic toll ticketing and other equipment installed.

Telephones in the Redondo exchange now number about 63,000, Vaupel said. He anticipates an additional 8750 phones during 1958.
