The THS horsehidiers will put their lone week of practice to test, and the Tartars new mentor, Will Boerger, will be banking on the right arms of Paul Moir, Ron Veres, and Gene Crenshaw—all slated for pitching duty—to start the campaign off on the right foot.

Grajeda Catches

Coach Boerger, who came to THS with five years of previous coaching experience in

Ohio, along with a career in professional ball himself as a pitcher, has indicated he'll definitely start Bobby Grajeda behind the plate, with Billy Williams at third, Russ Vanderpool and Bobby Farrington at shortstop and second base, and Tim Watkins and Crenshaw both slated for first base action.

In the outfield captain Gary Pfingston, Steve Foster, and Don Gray are probable starters.

When queried as to the prospects of this years diamond crew, Boerger replied, "the ability is there but the desire has to be stimulated."

Last year the Tartars under Dave Dana closed out the Bay League year with a 5-7 record.

The Tartars will carry 15 players on their active player roster, ten of which are returning lettermen from last season. They are: Moir, Veres, Lee Day, Pfingston, Veres, Larry Rose, Bobby Grajeda, Ray and Russ Vanderpool, and Tim Watkins.

Five Warrior Alums Land in Pro Leagues

At least five El Camino College baseball alums will continue their baseball careers with professional teams during the coming season.

Former All-American player Jack Evans is a forerunner of the Chicago Cubs training camp in Arizona. Evans played for the Warriors in 1956, gaining recognition as honorable mention third baseman in the Metropolitan Conference.

Evans' All-American honors were bestowed on him by the U. S. Amateur Baseball Assn. On graduation from Morningside High School, the 18-year-old prospect toured South Africa and the European countries with the cream of American amateur baseballers.

Evans played last year with Burlington, Iowa, and Magic Valley, Idaho.

Pitcher Signs
Another member of that 1956 squad is pitcher Phil Graf, who signed for \$4000 with the Los Angeles Dodgers. Graf will report to Vero Beach, Fla., March 1, assigned to the former Angels, Spokane, Wash. He was the first player

to be signed by the new LA Dodgers team.

Most recent players to sign professional contracts are Jerry Ott, shortstop, 1956, and pitcher Jimmy Lynn, 1957.

Ott was All-Metropolitan shortstop for the Warriors in 1957. He is a graduate of Mira Costa High School, where he was a star basketball and baseball player. He signed with the Kansas City Athletics and will go to spring training in Florida on March 1.

Lynn will also go with the Kansas City team. Jim is the son of former major league Red Lynn of the New York Giants.

Lynn last year played for Coach Doug Essick and received second spring recognition on the All-Metropolitan Conference team.

New El Camino College coach, Chuck Freeman, lost one player right off the squad this year. Outfielder-catcher Tom Aspray, brother of former Warrior pitcher Bob Aspray. Tom signed with the Athletics for an undisclosed amount.

Second Track-Field Meet Slated Friday

The track and field forces of Torrance High take in their second meet of the young season tomorrow afternoon at Inglewood starting at 3 p.m.

Coach Howard Brubaker's spike teams came out on the short end of the score in two of three classes, with the C team posting the lone victory in a triangular meet with Culver City, and South High on the Culver cinder last Tuesday.

In varsity competition Torrance was second to the Centaurs, 57½-48½, although Lenny Ehlers, Frank Corsentino, Jim Myers, and Jim McDougall twice took first place points in their respective events.

Ehlers copped the 440 yard run in a speedy 53.9, while Corsentino was taking first in the 880 with 2:09.8; Myers put the shot 44 feet to win, and McDougall took both the pole vault, with a vault of 11' 6", and the broad jump, with a leap of 18' 11½".

Coaches Brubaker and Irwin Kasten are looking toward a top track season this year and are banking on the above mentioned for many varsity points in future events.

In addition to the spikers listed above, much is expected from sprinters Butch White and Manfred Malner who were top 100 and 220 men in the B division last year.

In the class B and C results of Tuesdays meet, the Tartar Cee cindermen opened the season with a victory, taking a narrow nod over South 38-37, while Culver City came in with 21.
