

# Los Angeles Educators Eye Plans For \$158 Million Bond Election

A \$158,500,000 bond issue to provide classroom facilities—in elementary schools, junior and senior high schools, and junior colleges—for 90,000 students in the Los Angeles City Schools—may be placed on the June 3 general election ballot.

This recommendation was submitted to the City Board of Education Monday by Superintendent of Schools Ellis A. Jarvis. It was presented to the board in Jarvis' absence, since he is out of town on an educational conference, by Deputy Superintendent Dr. Louise Seyler and Associate Superintendent Virgil Volle, building program chief.

2534 Classrooms  
A total of 2534 classrooms, plus other additions and improvements, would be built under terms of this proposed bond issue if Los Angeles taxpayers approve the school building proposals to be on the

June 3 ballot. Since 1955, when a bond issue for \$133,000,000 was overwhelmingly approved by school district voters, classroom seats for approximately 75,000 youngsters have been provided in all areas of the rapidly growing system.

If adopted by the board, the summer bond issue being contemplated would be the largest school bond issue ever presented for approval to Los Angeles City School System voters. The bond issue's total will be finally set by the Board of Education by March 13.

A \$51,000,000 elementary school building program will provide for 40 new schools and an equivalent number of classrooms at existing schools to total an additional 38 complete schools.

New Plants  
The 40 new plants would provide 621 classrooms with the additions totaling 588 class-

rooms, or a final total of 1209 classrooms.

In the high schools, eight new junior high schools will be built along with six new senior high schools at a cost of \$81,500,000. Also scheduled for completion is the new Grover Cleveland Senior High School plant, which is being partially constructed with funds derived from the 1955 bond issue. In addition, architectural plans for five more junior high schools and three senior high schools would be prepared in anticipation of a future bond issue.

A total of 642 classrooms will be erected in the junior high schools and 534 in the senior high schools.

The junior colleges will receive 149 classrooms under terms of the recommendation.

Of the \$158,500,000 total, \$13,824,000 is earmarked for acquisition of new land, \$74,158,000 for construction of new

schools, \$43,432,000 for new facilities at existing schools, and \$6,000,000 for rehabilitation of buildings before 1932.
