That sin must be corrected here or hereafter, before it is forgiven, is the interpretation placed on the subject "Everlasting Punishment" which will be heard as the lesson-sermon in all Christian Science churches Sunday.

"Thine own wickedness shall correct thee, and thy backslidings shall reprove thee," is a selection from Jeremiah (2:19).

Mary Baker Eddy in "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures" amplifies this thought, when she says, "To remit the penalty due for sin, would be for Truth to pardon error. Escape from punishment is not in accordance with God's government, since justice is the handmaid of mercy" (p. 36).

### Hahn Decries County Plans For Tax Hike

Los Angeles County Supervisor Kenneth Hahn today termed the proposed county budget and tax increase "absolutely unrealistic."

Referring to the record expenditure of \$462 million and the five cent tax increase, Hahn declared:

"I firmly believe that we can hold the line on taxes, and with careful, judicious pruning and elimination of unessential, needless projects that we can even reduce the present tax rate.

"I am confident that there are a number of projects which can be deferred or postponed without disrupting an essential functions of local government."

Hahn also called upon the county to set an example for all other government agencies to follow in reducing taxes.

### Artist, Craftsmen Skills Combined in Manufacturing

Manufacturing aircraft combines professions of the exact sciences with skills of craftsmen and the techniques of an artist.

Located in North American Aviation's Los Angeles Division is one sample of the "artists' technique" where a stylus-type operated cavity mill performs its wonders on front spars of the supersonic F-100 Super Sabre.

This cavity mill, designed and tolled by North American, simplifies the complex operation of milling out a variety of cuts on the spar plus saving time, storage space, and man-hours.

The operator guides his "stylus" over the pattern setting the path for the end mill cutter. The cavity mill also cuts into both sides of the spar where needed.

Foreman Bill Purdon explained that there are scores of various type cuts required on the front spar, all a different size and depth and "the cavity mill permits us to make these cuts with one tooling set up."

In addition to saving handling and tooling time, the use of the cavity mill also eliminates warpage usually caused when a part must be moved countless number of times from one tool to another.

"Another important factor of our cavity mill operation," Purdon pointed out, "is that each-cutting operation is inspected right on the spot thus eliminating extensive reworking and setting up should a tolerance occasionally be exceeded."
