Marine Corps Program Set For Youths

The Marine Corps' special 120-day enlistment program which allows young men the opportunity to enlist now, and remain at home for up to four months is still available.

The announcement, made by First Sergeant John Dolly, local Marine recruiter, pointed out that it is an ideal program for high school graduates who are planning to enlist but would like to spend the summer months at home or working. The same program applies to young men who are about to be drafted but need the extra time at home to fulfill employment or personal obligations.

Men enlisted under the program are fulfilling up to four months of their military obligation right at home, and are earning an increase in pay before actually performing any active duty. He added that those young men who planned to go into service July, August and September should enlist during the months of May and June. This will assure them of being able to leave on the date they specify, otherwise quotas may be filled.
