The above mentioned check or bidder's bond shall be given as a guarantee that the bidder will comply with the terms of his signed bid; and if the successful bidder fails to comply with the terms of his signed bid, after acceptance thereof by the Board, his check or bond will be forfeited.

Preference shall be given to supplies, materials or equipment produced, manufactured or grown in the State of California.

The Board reserves the right to reject any and all bids or any part of a bid, and to waive any informality in the bids received.


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
