



Torrance Memorial Hospital Hails Its 35th Year



ROOM OF MIRACLES . . . The modern surgery at the community owned Torrance Memorial Hospital provides the most scientific equipment for heart surgery, brain surgery—in fact, surgeons are not limited in any recognized procedure to return a patient to maximum potential health. Specialized equipment such as the electrocardiograph and the automatic breathing apparatus is shown by Karen Engblom and Erna Zlomke. Surgery at the hospital has increased 400 per cent during the past 10 years with specialized and complicated surgical procedures are performed each day in the surgical theaters.







THE CLINICAL LAB . . . Detailed laboratory analyses are being made here by Markolita Adams and Leonard Sven in the hospital's modernized clinical laboratory. The activities of the laboratory are under the direction of certified


pathologists who evaluate each procedure and make a thorough study of all tissues removed during surgeries. Examinations here have risen 300 per cent to 46,336 in the past 10 years.
