**German Woman, 86, Flies 'Jet' to Visit Daughter**

"Ein wunderschoener flug", was the answer Mrs. Elizabeth Kalb gave when asked how she liked her trip here by plane from Frankfurt, Germany. Her daughter, Mrs. Jennie Norris, acting as interpreter added, "She said her trip by air was wonderful."

Mrs. Kalb at 86 years of age took her first trip by "luft" and was told she boarded the plane like a "celebrity". She made her recent trip flying from Frankfurt to Shannon, Ireland and then on to New York where she finished her journey to Los Angeles International Airport by jet.

A widow, Elisabeth Kalb has supported herself for the past 46 years and has lived in the same apartment in Frankfurt all of this time. She works as a janitress in the county health record building at home and takes care of 10 offices in her nocturnal cleaning employment.

The German visitor likes her own native cooking, although she thinks our hamburgers and chili are very "goot", but is amazed at our serve-yourself market system. She said that in Germany shoppers do not handle food — not even the vegetables. She added through

her daughter that in Germany "if you have the money you can get anything you want — if you have the money."

One of the "musts" on the dinner menu at the home, when Mrs. Kalb arrived, was her famous German dish "Rolladen". Since family and neighbors have all enjoyed this true German recipe, Mrs. Kalb has given it to the HERALD for all of its readers.

**ROLLADEN**

**Ingredients:**  
4 thin slices lean beef  
4 slices bacon  
2 tsp. prepared mustard  
1 medium size onion  
Salt and pepper

**Method:**  
Spread mustard on one side of each slice of beef. Chop bacon and onion fine and spread on top of mustard. Salt and pepper to taste. Roll each slice like jelly roll and fasten with toothpicks.

Roll in flour and brown on all sides in hot fat. Cover with water and simmer with lid on for about 2½ hours or until tender.

Serve with cooked macaroni and green salad.

Mrs. Kalb plans to stay with her daughter and son-in-law at 1623 Cota for at least four months and has taken a leave of absence from her job in Germany. Now she has made a trans-continental plane trip, is seeing America, but has never talked on a telephone.

Mrs. Norris met her husband while he was serving in the U.S. Army and was stationed in Germany during World War II. She met the Master Sergeant, who returned to Germany to marry her after he was discharged in the United States a year later, at the home of a friend. Their courtship was conducted with a language book between them.
