'East Lynne' Celebrates Centennial Opening Night

Celebrating its centennial anniversary this Summer as a theatrical offering is "East Lynne," which opened Thursday night at the Hermosa Pier Playhouse under the direction of Charles Gray. Taken seriously, it would be better left in the secure obscurity of century-old mothballs. With tongue in cheek, it is an amusing vehicle of entertainment for a hot summer's evening.

Those moments where the performers obviously enjoyed hamming the dialogue in satirical spirit provided laughs for the opening-night audience; but the play dragged heavily when the actors abandoned the touch of exaggeration and acted for acting's sake. Consistent treatment as 100 per cent melodrama would have

improved the total impression left on first-nighters.

The 100-year-old story dealt with the time-honored plot of virtue triumphing over evil. In this case a wife who betrayed her husband and children represented the evil; and the woman who succeeded her as her husband's wife was the symbol of good. Playing the role of Lady Isabel, the first wife to reside with Archibald Carlyle at the old English estate named East Lynne, was Mrs. Jackie Moore, who managed to keep tongue in cheek most of the time.

Richard Anderson, portraying Carlyle, also put in an adequate performance along the melodramatic lines. Strongest performers, however, were three lesser characters, whose comic interpretations of their roles provided the audience with the bulk of the laughs. As Sir Francis Levison, Ed Siem was a roguish villain with a twinkle in one eye while the other eye never left the ladies for a moment. Richard Terry's interpretation of Lord Mount Severn was the high spot of the evening. His facial and bodily expressions brought almost as many guffaws as the lines he dropped with comic seriousness as he portrayed the outraged, dottering uncle of Lady Isabel. Capturing comedy honors on the female front was Mrs. Margaret Fraser, who turned the role of Wilson the maid into sheer delight.

Ed Cook as Justice Hare proved a strong performer and good actor, with a straight interpretation of the role of a hunted man.

The sets and costumes appropriately looked as though they too had been dug out of mothballs. Nothing unusual

was offered in the way of lighting or sound effects.

Pleasantest moments of the evening took place during intermission when the Harmonaires, a barbershop quartet of red-checked vests and derby hats, provided medleys of old-time songs.

The play continues through Aug. 1.
