GREEN BEAN CASSEROLE

- 2 pkg. French Style Green Beans
- 1 med. chopped onion
- 1 can bean sprouts
- 1 can mushroom soup
- Diced Cheddar cheese
- 1 can onion rings

Cook green beans about two minutes. Then combine onion, bean sprouts, mushroom soup and cheddar cheese. Pour into casserole. Bake about 45 minutes. Top with can of onion rings, bake about 3 minutes until brown.

BAKED LASAGNA

Cook lasagna in salt water until tender. Drain and place in large pan.

- Sauce: 1 lg. can tomatoes
- 2 lb. ground meat
- 2 garlic cloves
- 4 cans tomato paste
- Salt and pepper

Brown meat with garlic cloves. Add tomatoes, tomato paste and salt and pepper. Let cook until thick. Add water from paste and tomatoes and let simmer for 1 1/2 hours. Pour sauce over lasagna and add Romano cheese and mazzarilli cheese in slices. Bake until cheese melts.

STRAWBERRY PIE

- 2 boxes strawberries
- 3 tbsps cornstarch
- Keep one box strawberries whole. Crush other strawberries and cook with cornstarch, sugar and lemon juice. Cook until thick. Place whole strawberries on pie crust. Pour cooked mixture over whole berries. Let stand.

MAPLE WALNUT PUDDING

Boil 1 1/4 cups sugar and 3 cups of water for five minutes. Pour into baking dish.

- Mix together: 1/2 cup nuts
- 1/2 c sugar
- 1 tsp cinnamon
- 1 tbsps cocoa
- 1 cup flour
- 2 tsp baking powder
- 1/2 cup sweet milk
- 1 tbsps melted butter
- 1 cup raisins

Drop this mixture by spoonfuls into syrup. Bake in a 350 degree oven.
