Television Show Helps Inventors Develop Ideas

Introduction of what is believed to be a revolutionary new invention was made on the "You and Your Big Ideas" television program recently. The invention is called Max-A-Loc and is an electronic combination operated lock.

The inventor and developer of the lock is Harvey Brody, 1925 Grace St., who said his combination lock may be used

to great advantage where conventional locks are used and on anything from automobiles to desks. The Cossman Co., after seeing the lock on the television program, has agreed to manufacture the item.

Brody, and the packagers of the "You and Your Big Ideas" program, Bob and Mickie Smith, young Torrance couple, had the novel lock on display at the Southwood Thriftmart
