# PORK... BEEF...

Homemakers are pleased to learn that for at least 12 months pork will be a very good buy. At the same time it is expected that beef supplies and prices will stay about the same as last year.

Have you ever thought about how your shopping habits might bring about market changes? For example, you have noticed "special" prices on some meat items... chuck cuts, for one. Do you know why? Shopper's demands change. In summer homemakers want meat cuts that are suitable for quick-cooking or for easy outdoor meals. Cuts that take longer to cook are hardest to sell in the summer. To move these less demanded cuts retailers put them out as "specials."

The flavorful chuck makes up about 20 per cent of the beef carcass. From it we get arm chuck roasts, blade chuck roasts and chuck steaks. Because these cuts are less tender they need a little special attention. They must be either cooked in moist heat to tenderness, or tenderized with a commercial meat tenderizer.

What about using a meat tenderizer? If you wish to broil a chuck steak you will want to tenderize it. Commercial tenderizers represent man's effort to make meat more tender. The active ingredient in most tenderizers is papain... a plant enzyme from that delicious fruit, papaya. The papain acts on meat, breaking apart the muscle fiber protein and connective tissue. The action is

similar to that of digestion, and makes the food more absorbable.

Studies made at the Davis Campus of the University show that it is unnecessary to treat meat with the tenderizer and hold it for a period of time before cooking. Working the papain into the meat with a fork is the most important step. The greatest tenderizing takes place at temperatures of 140° F. to 176° F., not a room temperature. Then as the heat is increased during the cooking the tenderizing action of the papain is completely stopped.
