Garden Checklist

By California Association of Nurserymen

- Stake and tie tomato plants to keep the fruit off the ground and to insure even ripening.
- A dash of water on the leaves of plants makes the garden seem fresh, but it will do the plant no good unless you put plenty at the base, too. Water deeply.
- Exhibition blooms on Dahlias are the result of pinching side buds along the stem of the plant, leaving terminal buds to grow for show.
- Marguerites in gallon cans are available at nurseries to give you bloom color from the time you plant them in the garden.
- Keep after weeds in lawn. Don't use the weed killers, however, on clover or dichondra lawns. They're not selective to distinguish these from broad leaved weeds.

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
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Evangelist to Meet With Foursquares
