Pilot Delegates At Convention

Mrs. Charles B. Mitchell, president of the Pilot Club of Torrance, has just returned from attending the 38th International Convention of Pilot International at the Palmer House in Chicago, July 21-25, as the official delegate of the local club. Mrs. Georgena V. Havlena of Washington, D.C.

was installed as president of the international organization on Saturday, July 25, at the closing sessions of the convention which was attended by delegates from more than 400 Pilot Clubs throughout the United States, Canada, England, France, Bermuda and Japan, representing approximately 12,000 members.

Mrs. Mitchell has been a resident of Torrance for 24 years, is a past president of the Torrance Woman's Club, and has been quite active in community service. She became a member of the Pilot Club of Torrance in April of 1956 and has served two terms as the club's treasurer prior to being installed as its president in May of this year. She is the manager of the note department of the Bank of America branch in Torrance.

Also in attendance at the convention was Mrs. Joseph A. DeJaifre of the Pilot Club of Torrance, who is the Lieutenant Governor of District 18 (California), who also attended pre-convention sessions of the Governors' Council on July 19-20, and served on the Room Arrangements Committee of the convention. Before returning to Torrance, Mrs. DeJaifre will spend a few weeks visiting relatives in the East.

Among the prominent speakers at the convention was Rev. John J. Flanagan, S.J., of St. Louis, Mo., Executive Director of the Catholic Hospital Association, whose talk was based on the 1958-59 Pilot theme: "Understanding — Our Hope for Tomorrow." The theme of 1959-60's program will be "Friendship and Service—Our Best Investment." Plans were announced to hold the next convention at San Francisco in July of 1960.

Pilot International is a classified civic and service organization for executive business and professional women, founded in 1921 in Macon, Georgia. The clubs participate in civic affairs and patriotic activities, sponsor a variety of community service projects, and provide scholarships to aid students from other countries.
