

BEST BUYS FOR THE WEEK

In Torrance Markets

Homemakers' marketing will be easy this week. California's horn of plenty is spilling over into our markets.

APPLES. Wonderful California Gravensteins.

AVOCADOS. Most abundant variety is Hass, a delicious summer fruit.

MELONS. Cantaloups... a little higher because hot weather exhausted some older fields. More Cranshaws, Honeydews, Persian and Watermelons. Nectarines, Pears and Plums.

PEACHES. California growers say that the Elberta is the "Cinderella" of the peach family. They are the best peach buy of the season... but they are not as colorful as some of the other varieties. Elbertas are perfect for just good eating... fresh, cooked, canned or frozen.

VEGETABLES: Corn, Eggplant, Lettuce... variable quality. Peppers... many varieties. Sweet Potatoes... new crop, and Tomatoes.

PROTEIN FOODS

Price-wise you may be most interested in pork. Some of the cuts are appearing at quite lowered prices. Beef and lamb are also "specialized." You'll be able to work wide variety into your menus without stretching beyond your budget if you'll plan your shopping.

POULTRY is being nudged by pork for the number-one spot on the economy list. Chicken fryers continue in the low price bracket, and turkey (both hens and toms) are pouring into market. Turkey is favorably priced.

EGGS. After a long, long session of bargains in all sizes you'll find you may have to change your egg shopping plans. The trend is for higher prices on large, medium and small sizes may give you more for your money. Compare prices.

FISH. The California fish industry reports that white sea bass is the "seafood of the month"... barracuda and swordfish expected in abundance also.

Agricultural Extension Service at the University of Minnesota highly recommends this super-easy way to freeze apples: First, wash them. Then place whole apples in polyethylene or similar plastic bags and freeze. They will not be suitable for eating like fresh apples, but they're fine for pies and other cooked desserts. To prepare, run cold water over each frozen apple just before peeling. Peel and slice as you would a fresh apple and use immediately. Don't thaw the apples before peeling... they discolor readily.

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
