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

(Continued from Page 1) one week-night and Saturdays for a rental fee of \$100, the letter stated.

VAN DYKE continued in his letter that cost of new uniforms had left the band budget inadequate for paying rent and that the group would need \$100 per month from the city for the balance of the fiscal year.

Speaking from the floor Van Dyke told the council that he had started looking for quarters immediately after he learned the auditorium had been sold, but that either high rent, or poor acoustics, had made available buildings impractical.

Mayor Albert Isen asked Van Dyke if he had queried Torrance school officials on the possibility of using their auditoriums.

Van Dyke replied that he had contacted Dr. J. H. Hull, superintendent of city schools, and had been told that their auditoriums were not available for the use of the band.

"DR. HULL hasn't the power to keep a public organization out of the school district auditoriums," Councilman George Bradford inserted into the discussion. Bradford also said that in his opinion school buildings and auditoriums were available free of charge to all civic activities and cited existing favorable conditions in other cities and school districts.

George Stevens, city manager, told the HERALD during recess that "although the schools have their own bands the city was under contract with the youth band to furnish music for occasions warranting such entertainment." He also said that the city had subsidized the band this year for a sum of \$2,500.

Rivieran Gets Guided Missile Badge From AF

Col. Raymond E. Hogan, USAF, who resides at 4925 Calle de Arboles, has been awarded the Air Force Guided Missile Badge, it was reported this week.

The new silver insignia, which represents a rocket climbing to a field of stars, is the missile equivalent of Air Force wings and is worn on the left breast pocket of the uniform.

Colonel Hogan is chief of the policies and procedures office of the Air Materiel Command's Ballistic Missile Center at Inglewood. The BMC, commanded by Major General Ben I. Funk, is responsible for procurement, production, and logistic support of the Atlas, Titan, Thor, and Minuteman missile weapon systems, of Air Force satellite systems, and other advanced projects.
