Next on the agenda is the showing of a film on childbirth by Mrs. Kenneth Mattys, hospital supervisor of obstetrics, who does the commenting on each phase from the labor room through the birth and ends with detailed information on the care of a new baby.

The management of the Torrance Memorial Hospital feels that when these mothers-to-be leave they have learned a great deal about facilities in the maternity wing, the care they will receive and have become acquainted with staff members who will tend them when their time arrives.
