Lee in Lead At Ascot Oval Cycle Races

Young Troy Lee of McRiviera, only rated an amateur, carries the 1959 motorcycle racing leadership into tomorrow evening's chase at New Ascot Stadium.

First race is set for 8:30, following time trials at 7.

The jockey-sized Lee boomed into undisputed possession of first place in the season standings by riding off with a spectacular victory in the main event last week. He set a new track record in the process.

Lee is a comparative newcomer to cycle racing, thus accounting for his amateur rating. But his skills are such that he is leading all the expert riders in the point totals. Brad Andres returns from a brief flying trip to the East to add more contention to this week's program. Andres won the Daytona Beach 200-mile National Championship earlier this year.

Ready to roll too, he hopes, is the "Flying Flea" Sammy Tanner. The tiny Texan has experienced mechanical problems the past two weeks and has failed to make the program.
