Early America

Hilborn Family 'Turns Back Clock' in Modern Day Living

Walking into the Hilborn home is like turning the clock back 75 years, and the clock that hangs on the wall in their living room was probably in style at the turn of the century. Mr. and Mrs. Robert Hilborn live at 24229 Hawthorne Blvd. in a house furnished with collector's items that would make many antique dealers green with envy, or at least give them a good start in business.

Aside of the fact that their furniture is of vintage age and the walls are covered with lamps and what-nots of the early period, the Hilborns are a normal and likeable folks. Bob is an air traffic control specialist with the Federal Aviation Agency, drives a sports car, and is handy at repairing old furniture and antiques.

Mrs. Hilborn carries out the duties of the average housewife but uses an old time coffee grinder for the morning breakfast drink, keeps flour and other kitchen necessities in a 60-year-old bin table. Many of the utensils she uses daily in preparing meals were used by her mother and her grandmother before. She loves to play a pump organ that has been in her family for generations.

Son Mike is 15 years of age, is an Explorer Scout, and has as fine a collection of old time hand pistols, rifles and shotguns as can be found in the area. His favorite is a Remington .44 with a hair-trigger that was a must in early frontier days. Mike raises quail and finch for a hobby.

Sister Robin, 9, is a Girl Scout and has her play-house furnished with many old-time things including a miniature coal range. Dolls are her hobby and she has one given her by Santa from Santa's Village, in Skyforest.

The Hilborns became antique-ers after they visited Salt Lake City in 1950 and found that many interesting items could be found in out-of-the-way shops. Since then they have talked relatives and

friends out of cast off furniture and "treasures" from yesteryears that had been stored in cellars and attics.

Besides the pump organ and clock the Hilborns' living room has a spinning wheel, crank telephone (that really works for inter-room communication), a dry sink that houses a television, hi-fi radio and record player and a gas parlor wood and coal burning stove that was used to cook dinner once when utilities went out of order in the neighborhood due to an automobile accident.

The kitchen resembles the one grandma used with old time cupboards and copper pot and crocks. The bathroom has an ancient washstand. But the bedrooms are the rooms with the old time look. Bedstands made in the popular spool design of the 1880's, a stage coach trunk, singletrees that support overhead lights and a carved love seat that no doubt could tell interesting stories if it could talk.

Bob Hilborn believes that "delving into history is like reliving it" and living in a house full of old time furniture and nick-knacks brings back good memories. Mrs. Hilborn said that as long as they live in an antique shop they might as well open the front door for business, but added that she "loves it."
