Returning Lettermen Key to El Camino's Fall Grid Hopes

Returning backfield lettermen provide the key to hopes of El Camino College for the 1959 Metropolitan grid race. Confronted by a large numerical turnout, a promising backfield and a small line, Coach Norm Verry and his coaching assistants are going full steam ahead for the traditional Varsity-Alum scrimmage on Murdock Field at 8 p.m. Saturday.

Returnees Dave Long, Glen Kezar, Ron Goodrich, and Gene Williams promise to spark the Warrior offensive for the coming season. Reinforced by such incoming talent as that of Ron Veres of Torrance and Jimmy Lindsey, who returns following a three-year absence, the squad anticipates that backfield problems are under control.

THE WARRIOR line presents a different picture, however. Returning from the '58 squad are Ends Charlie Valencia and Brian Hoose, Center George Hahlbeck, Guard Bill Montgomery and Tackles Don Brizzolara and Bob Van Calcar. Newcomers to the blue and gray make no great impression of the scales; coaches hope that strategy, speed and impact will compensate for lack of beef, however.

The return of Bill Heames, following a season's loss with a broken ankle, is being hailed with enthusiasm in the Warrior camp. Reames will be counted upon heavily to fill the spot held last season by ECC's one All-Metro player, tackle Wayne Atkins.

EXPECTED to bolster the tribal front are newcomers Ed Jauregui from North High in Torrance; Don Bishop and Sam Hard from Inglewood and Mike Garrula, Serra High via San Diego State.

On one factor the ECC coaching staff of Verry, Alums Ken Swearingen and Don Jurk and Doug Essick agree. The '59 grid machine should be an improvement over that which took to the field in the Alum scrimmage a year ago.

In the opponent's camp, there are no worries regarding experience. The talented flipper of Paul Held continues to thrill opening scrimmage audiences each year.

AMONG OTHER top-notchers who will return to the field of their endeavors will be Billy Crawford, Dick Dangelo, Don Cornell, Preston Bills, Jim Reynolds, Vince Benstead, Gee

Johnson, Dick DeArmitt, Larry Oien, Bill Autrey, Paul Pedigo and Wayne Atkins.

Faded fragrance of roses will cling to the air in the scrimmage as Alum Coach Socko Torres supplements this formidable line-up with former JC greats who stormed Pasadena in the Junior Rose Bowl game of 1954. Among these standouts will be Stan Becker, Don Greco, Gerie Wight, Pat Reagan, Fabian Abram, Roy Benstead, Larry Roy and Warren Wardlow.

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


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
