

New Christian Church to Start Services Sunday

Plans are now complete for a "Community Rally" to set forth the plans for the new Del Amo Church of Christ—A Christian Church.

The rally is to be held Saturday, Sept. 26, at 7:30 p.m., at Lawndale Church of Christ, 147th and Larch Sts.

Mr. Charnell indicated that the whole community is invited to attend the "rally" and regular services of the church because, "Torrance is a family community, and the church is a family institution."


