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Stockroom space is located directly under the departments and merchandise is brought to the floor at appropriate points by elevator. The marking room is mechanized by a roller conveyor system. Where goods are unpacked, the wrappings and empty containers are carried automatically to the immense paper baler capable of handling five one-thousand-pound bales of trash each day. The installation has won the plaudits of the Air Pollution Control District, Fire Chief J. J. Benner, and City Manager George Stevens of Torrance.

Maximum customer convenience has been achieved through display and grouping of all types of merchandise by size, by purpose and by color, and through a coordinated system of informative signs, packaging and labelling. The store is equipped with a TelAuto-graph device that electronically forwards instructions from department areas to storage areas for swift customer pick-up service. Background music, classified in five different categories, brisk, gay, sweet, melodic, and quiet, is programmed continuously through the store's speaker system.

Opening of the new retailing enterprise will add 1200 persons to the South Bay payroll. Architects for the development are Stiles and Robert Clements.

Pensioners To Get Data On New Acts

Persons receiving pensions from the Veterans Administration, including widows and orphans as well as veterans, were reassured by Veterans Service Officer Bessie D. Slonecker today that they automatically will receive printed information about the new Pension Act of 1959.

The Service Officer said she has been advised by the VA that a summary of the provisions of the new law, recently signed by the President to take effect next July 1, will be sent out with all September pension checks.

She emphasized that veterans receiving COMPENSA-

TION checks, for service-connected disabilities, will not receive the pension summary because it does not apply to them.

It was also pointed out that the new pension act will affect those already on the pension rolls only if they choose to change over, in order to receive higher payments to which they may be entitled. The Service Office, at 1622 Gramercy Ave., will be available for assistance and guidance.

ONE OF THE major changes in the new law is that after next July 1, widows of World

War II and Korean Conflict veterans will merely have to submit proof that the veteran was in active service for 90 days and was discharged under other than dishonorable conditions, in order to collect widow's pension. Widows of World War I veterans have always had only this simply active duty requirement.

At present, widows of World War II and Korea must submit evidence that the veteran had a service-connected disability.

The VA asks veterans and dependents not to write directly to the VA about their pensions. AH who have an op-


tion under the new law will receive the pension summary with their September checks, and a detailed analysis will follow at a later date. Those who do not receive a summary may be assured that the new law does not apply to them, the VA emphasizes.
