

Special Parade to Fete Retiring Local Sergeant

Sergeant First Class Ernest J. Rios, a Torrance resident since the age of 14 and a former Torrance High School student, will be retired from the Army Wednesday following a special parade in his honor at Fort Mason, Calif.

Although the veteran of 20 years spent most of his military career as a platoon sergeant or gun commander, some of his time was spent in special services promoting athletics as part of the Army's physical fitness program.

Sergeant Rios was born in Brooklyn and moved to Torrance when he was 14. After attending Torrance High, he enlisted at Fort MacArthur in 1937.

His career includes assignments in Hawaii, Europe, the Far East, wartime action in the South Pacific, and peacetime duty in the United States.

DURING HIS military career, Sergeant Rios' interest in athletics extended beyond the spectator position. In 1937, while stationed in Hawaii, he won the Army's light heavy-weight boxing championship of the South Pacific. He kept this title until 1941. During the same period he was a member of his company's swimming team. He also has boxed professionally in Hollywood while stationed at Fort MacArthur.

After World War II, he left the service for a brief period. He was employed at two major motion picture studios as a "grip."




