The new system, started in the Sheriff's Lennox and Lakewood Stations on Sept. 1, 1959, will be standard procedure throughout all stations by Dec. 1, 1959.

... Sears (Continued from Page 1) ings from light to dark. The display demonstrates how each of the color families merges pleasantly with the color of any item of home furnishings in its corresponding family range.

THE WESTERN section of the main floor is actually a mammoth specialty shop of appliances, housewares, electric lighting fixtures, building supplies, sporting goods, hardware, and other goods known in the jargon of the retail trade as "hard lines."

Here the smaller merchandise, displayed by new fixturing arrangement, has been brought much farther forward into customer view in larger volume quantities than former fixturing ever made possible.

The proximity of the 24 car service station to the main store building makes it convenient for customers to have their cars serviced while shopping.

ANOTHER INNOVATION is the greatly expanded catalog shopping service, which makes possible shipment from any one of Sears 11 warehousing plants in the nation of specially ordered merchandise or gift selections to any point in the United States.

In the paint department an ingenious blending machine by the press of a button dispenses the correct amount of colorant to match unerringly any of 1000 different shades.

The new store is cooled by a plant of 572 tons of refrigeration capacity supplying 326,000 cubic feet of filtered, conditioned air per minute. A total of 174 color tones have been applied in the interior decorative treatment.

THE STORE houses 52 different merchandise departments. It is equipped with a communication system for carrying announcements and music throughout the building and its receiving and marking room, criss-crossed by conveyors, keeps merchandise on wheels and rollers from the time it is moved from deep inside delivery trucks until it reaches the stock shelves.

Men in 32 different trades put more than 200,000 man hours into building the store. Its construction started Sept. 11, 1958.

Yes, the Steel Strike Could Be Settled Today— if the American People Want to Surrender to Inflation



The steel strike could end any day if the steel companies would just give in to the inflationary demands of the Union leaders.

But is that what America wants?

Not according to numerous public opinion studies showing overwhelmingly that people fear and oppose the further spread of inflation.

Not according to polls of steelworkers' opinion showing that they would rather preserve the purchasing power of their present high wages than get more dollars that buy less.

Not according to countless statements by responsible representatives of government.

If inflation is to be halted, a start must be made somewhere, by someone — and now!

Steel companies know they can't do the job on their own. But they believe they can make a start and can set an example — and they are doing their best to do so.

The steel companies have made a non-inflationary proposal to the Union:

They have asked the Union to help eliminate wasteful practices, friction and misunderstanding. In return the companies have offered to improve pensions and insurance this year and to increase wages next year.

The Union has rejected this proposal.

Understandably there is growing impatience in the country over the long continuance of the strike called by the Union. Certainly the steel companies, whose losses are running into the millions every day, share this impatience. So do our employees, whose earnings are stopped.

When the strike is settled is undeniably important, but how it is settled is even more important.

Surrender to the Union leaders' terms would mean more years of inflation. Can the nation afford to pay this price? That is the real question.

The companies continue to hope that the Union leaders will recognize the national need to help prevent further increases in the cost of living and will join in reaching a truly non-inflationary agreement.
