The following presidential voting information for new resident requirements has been released:

Persons Who May Vote for President Only—

Under California law, a person who has been a resident of California for at least 54 days but less than

one year prior to a presidential election may vote for presidential electors at that election but for no other offices, provided:

1. He was either a qualified elector in another state immediately prior to his removal to California or would have been eligible to vote there if he had remained until the election;

2. He submits a "Certification of Qualifications" form
