Open for less than one year, it has served the community in three ways, Mrs. Taylor reports. To some it has provided an opportunity to buy good used items at only a fraction of their original cost; to others it is an opportunity to fill space hours by performing a valuable service to the YWCA; and to the YWCA it is an opportunity to augment funds supplied by the Community Chest while providing a useful service.

No hodge-podge rummage sale store is this, but one where articles are repaired, pressed and mended by a committee of active YW volunteers. The items are displayed by Mrs. William Lever.

Mrs. Lawrence Myers has been in charge of staffing the shop since it opened. This means having two volunteers to wait on the customers whenever the shop is open. The hours are 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Thursdays, 10 a.m. to 8:30 p.m. on Fridays, and 10 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. on Saturdays. The store is located at 359 W. 7th St., San Pedro.

The pricing committee works each Tuesday at the shop. This group includes Mmes. Daryl Vaughn and Marion Young, co-chairmen, assisted by Mrs. Clyde Eccles and Misses Catherine Lockett, Inez Smith and Frances Clark.

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
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
