Some 240 new teachers will report for duty in Torrance Schools next Thursday, Sept. 8, in orientation sessions at the district's 33 schools. Students will return the following Wednesday, Sept. 14.

All teachers will come back on Monday, Sept. 12, to prepare for teaching nearly 27,000 students. Total teaching staff members will be more than 1000.

County Plans Major Work On Area Sts. . . Annex

County Road Department announced its 1960-61 budget this week for the Fourth District. The budget calls for more than \$2,500,000 in major highway projects during the next fiscal year.

Bridges and engineering work is slated at Main St. and Torrance Lateral, Moneta Ave. and Dominguez Channel, and Vermont Ave. and Torrance Lateral. Also scheduled are engineering and acquisition of right of way for widening on Del Amo Blvd. from Avalon to Wilmington Bldgs., Sepulveda Blvd. from Figueroa to Main Sts. and Victoria St. from Santa Fe to the Long Beach city limits.

Money has also been allotted for the engineering work and acquisition of a right-of-way for Del Amo Blvd. from Prospect Ave. to Western Ave. The allotment includes funds for construction from Maple Ave. to Crenshaw Blvd.

between Prairie and Dominguez Channel, and attempt annexation of property east of the channel in conjunction with the Moneta Gardens area. Then the park would serve as a necessary connecting link."

STERLING THEN warns that the Moneta Gardens area "could then outvote any part of our area. Under Annexation Laws, a protest petition must be 51 per cent of the entire area to be annexed, and thus we cannot use a protest petition to exclude just our portion."

Sterling asked residents not to sign the current protest petitions, but to let the residents decide at an annexation election.

Tuesday's hearing is scheduled to get under way shortly after 5:30 p.m. in the city council chambers. With several thousands residents involved, Tuesday's hearing could be one of the best attended sessions of the council in recent years.
