71 Report to EC; Veres Top QB Prospect

A bountiful turnout of 71 candidates including 11 returning lettermen and 17 players weighing in around the 200 pound mark have El Camino College's Norm Verry bouncing with optimism for the coming 1960 football wars.

A heavy list of new recruits and sophomore vets, including Ron Veres, "Athlete of the Year" last season, are reporting to daily drills at the junior college campus.

VERES, a Torrance High product, is expected to see plenty of duty at the all-important signal-calling slot.

All told, 16 of the 71 prospects were groomed in either Torrance High, North, or South high schools.

Among the more promising recruits, according to early session performances are guard Bruce Bero, a 225 pounder from Serra High; the highly touted James Valmore, a 165 pound halfback speedster from Leuzinger; Jim Perry, 250 pound tackle from Luezing; Redondo's Mike Herman (215), a tackle; Manfred Mainer, a halfback who played in the same Torrance High backfield for two years with Veres, and Halfback Lou Rizzo, an Ohio transfer product.

THE WARRIORS' first big scrimmage will be the annual duel with the college alums on Friday night, Sept. 16.

The team's first game is set for Sept. 24 at Klamath Falls, Ore., against Oregon Tech.

Head Coach Verry — who returns to his 9th season at the ECC helm, will be assisted by end coach Doug Essick, back coach Ken Swearingen, and line coach Don Jurk.

SWEARINGEN and Essick are El Camino alumni.

Special Barge Fares Go in Effect Tuesday

Barges, half-day boats and all-day boats fishing in offshore Redondo Beach waters are giving anglers increased catches of halibut, bonita, barracuda and yellowtail.

IN ADDITION TO a generally improved fishing picture, sportfisher skippers report seeing large schools of yellowfish off Redondo Fisherman's Wharf.

Of these schools, experienced anglers are bringing in yellowtail in the 15 to 20-pound category.

BARGE FARE "special" starts Sept. 6 when fares will be cut to \$2 per person seven days a week, according to fishing chief Gordon McRae. The lower all-week fare will enable many anglers to get in a final lick before the summer vacation season draws to a close.

Barges located off Redondo Fisherman's Wharf are the "Sacramento," a 300-foot-long ex-ferry boat, and the "C-Coaster." They are three miles offshore at Redondo.

Rams, Cowboys Make Live Debut on TV



L.A. Given Edge in Exhibition

Southland fans get their first television look at the 1960 Rams and their first look ever at the Dallas Cowboys today when the two National Football League rivals clash at Pendleton, Oregon. The exhibition encounter will be televised by KNXT-TV (2) beginning at 3 p.m.

Adding to the flavor of the first Rams - Cowboys meeting is the fact that both teams have enjoyed unexpected success during the early stages of the exhibition season.

THE RAMS, 2-10 last year, lost their opener to the Philadelphia Eagles, 20-7, but have rebounded with impressive victories over the Redskins, 26-21, and the Cleveland Browns, 22-17.

The Cowboys, only 12 weeks away from their first meeting as a team, sport a 1-3 exhibition record, but the won-lost standard does not tell the true, and amazing, story. The Cowboys lost to the San Francisco 49ers, 16-10, the St. Louis Cardinals, 20-13, and the Baltimore Colts, 14-10, before knocking off the defending Eastern Division champion New York Giants last weekend, 14-3.

Thus, in four games, the fledgling Cowboys have allowed an average of only 13 points a game to opponents.

The Rams will send their usual offensive weapons, plus such newcomers as Dick Bass and end Carroll Dale against a team that has only two rookies in its starting lineup. The draw which gave Dallas three veterans from each NFL club stocked Landry with proven talent.

FORMER RAMS who will be out to beat their ex-teammates Sunday will be all-pro Duane Putnam, tackle Bob Fry and defensive halfback Tom Franckhauser. All three are listed as defensive starters for the Cowboys.

Landry's offensive stars include quarterbacks Eddie LeBaron and Don Meredith, halfback L. G. Dupre and wingback Frank Clarke, who was on the receiving end of two 73-yard scoring pass plays in the upset of the Giants.

South to Abandon Multiple Offense

Head Coach David Tollefson is planning a major offensive formation change for his revamped South High football team this fall as he curiously awaits the first head-bumping session of some 50 varsity hopefuls Tuesday morning. Tollefson—who guided South to a co-share of the Pioneer League championship last year — says he'll abandon his multiple (T-single wing) offense and go strictly with a Wing T series for the 1960 season, which undoubtedly will be the Spartans' toughest yet.

FOR SOUTH — just four years old — will become the youngest and newest member of the power-laden Bay League when classroom doors open in two weeks.

And on top of that, the Spartans will have only five returning varsity lettermen from 1959 after losing 20 monogram earners through June graduation.

"We try to adjust to our personnel, and although the single-wing worked real well for us, we feel we have to go with the new system this year," he explained.

DAVE SAID that he'd call in the versatile Joe Austin — already a three year veteran — to try his hand at quarterbacking, with bulldozing Bob Wehrhan—another three year vet—set for one of the halfback spots.



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Hubert Strikes Out 16 Batters in 12-1 Rout Over Coachella Valley

Sizzling Carey Hubert picked up his fourth straight tournament pitching victory and fired smokeballs past 16 Coachella Valley batters as Torrance's all-stars ran off with the Southern California Municipal Athletic Federation (SCMAF) championship Thursday with an easy 12-1 win at Prairie Park in Hawthorne.

Torrance — sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce — scored at least one run in every inning save the fifth in making a clean sweep of four southland foes for the SCMAF title. The tourney was for boys 13-15 years old.

Manage Bo Palica and Coach Clarence Rivalli selected their entire squad from the Torrance Babe Ruth League.

Hubert, who helped that league all-star team to the 1959 Southern California championship, hiked his four game strikeout total to 49 for 22 innings of work.

That's an average of 2.4 K's per inning.

Perhaps even equaling that was Carey's feat of swiping three bases — including home — with two outs in the first inning in a daring display of base running.

All told the locals slugged 12 hits as every player on the Torrance roster made the boxscore.

The Palica men actually wrapped it up in the first when Hubert drew a base on balls then methodically and menacingly made his way around to score.

The team added three insurance markers in the 2nd, the big blow being Jason Castillo's double, then added more spice to the cake with five runs in the 4th inning.

Coachella's only tally was produced in the 5th when an error, sandwiched be-

tween two singles, resulted in a denied plate.

Shortstop Ernie Clayton led the way for Torrance with three hits in four trips.

On their way to the title, Torrance upended Sportsman's Park 2-1, Rosemead 6-3, Glendale on total bases, 11-8 after a 0-0 tie, and Coachella Valley .Hubert gained credit for all four wins, even though he pitched to just 3 batters in the 3rd game.

A Torrance vs. South Torrance skirmish for the SCMAF crown was averted when Coachella edged South on total bases, 34-33, after a two-hour time limit 7-7 tie in the semi-finals.

In the consolation bracket, Sportsman's Park took home a trophy after beating Monterey Park Police Cadets, 4-0.
