Peninsula Committee of the Children's Hospital will stage its 1960 Portuguese Bend National Horse Show on Sept. 24 and 25 at the Portuguese Bend Riding Club. All proceeds from the benefit will go to the Convalescent Home of the Children's Hospital. Co-chairmen of this year's show are Mrs. John G. Davidson and Mrs. James C. Franks. Announcer for the show, which is accredited by the American Horse Shows Assn., will

be Allen Ross, "Mr. Horse Show" of the west. Top exhibitors of California and Arizona will be among the 300 or more entrants anticipated.

The Junior show on Saturday will have three medal classes among the 18 classes competing. Winners of the medal classes will be eligible to enter final competitions for United States championships in October at the Cow Palace in San Francisco, and in November at the Madison Square Gardens in New York.

The open show on Sunday will have eight stake classes competing along with hunters, jumpers and Shetland ponies. On Saturday evening the Peninsula Committee will be hostesses at the "Horse Opera" ball in the courtyard at the riding club. All proceeds will go to the children's hospital. Co-chairmen of this brilliant social affair will be Mmes. James Ingebreten and Seymour Yardley Warner, Jr.

On Sunday evening following the last event, exhibitors will

be entertained at a cocktail buffet at the Seahorse Trough, refreshment area under the trees near the show ring. Another party will be underway for the junior exhibitors after their last event on Saturday evening.

Mrs. Wright has been active in politics for 10 years. She first participated in the 1950 Nixon election, and since that time has received the Congressional Record from Nixon, indexing it for political use. She compiled campaign speakers' manuals for Senator Kuchel and Knowland's governorship campaign; researched and wrote the Knowland-Brown and Thenham-Richards comparisons and recently wrote the Portrait of Dick Nixon and other material on Nixon and 1960 issues.

For two years, Mrs. Wright has been Research chairman of the L.A. County Federation of

Republican Women. She has also been legislation, education and Americanism chairman of this organization. She served two years as alternate on the County Central Committee, two terms as associate member of the State Central Committee, and served on the County Federation Nationalities Committee. She has been a member of the County Central Committee Speakers' Bureau.
