Pair, Airlifted from Missionary Fields of Africa to Speak Here

Rev. and Mrs. Norman Riddle, recently airlifted from their Missionary Field in Vanga, Africa, will be speaking Sunday evening at 7:30 at the First Baptist Church of Torrance, 2118 Carson St., according to a news release by Rev.

Robert Dehn, assistant pastor. Norman Riddle is a native Californian, born in Pasadena, a graduate of Poly High in Long Beach and spent his entire childhood in Long Beach. After attending Bob Jones University and California Baptist Seminary, Rev. and Mrs. Riddle were appointed to the Mis-

sion Field in the Congo in 1952, spending one year in Belgium studying language before going to Vanga which is 350 miles inland from Leopoldville. Since that time the Riddles have worked with churches and school in 465 villages ministering to 40,000 people. There are now 38 indigenous churches plus on Bible teacher for each village who teaches Bible and first grade work.

Since their furlough in 1958, according to Rev. Riddle, he has spent his time training African leaders to be capable of carrying on their own work, never realizing that it would be necessary so soon. On July 17th the Riddles were airlifted by helicopter from Vanga and taken where they boarded the Globemaster which flew them home. The entire community is invited to hear this message. A nursery is provided for all services.

AiResearch Move to Torrance Begins Next Month Says Official

AiResearch early next month will take possession of its new \$2.6 million facility in Torrance, announced Richard E. Palmer, division manager, who said that plans call for full operation in the new plant by the end of the year.

Approximately 800 employees will be transferred to the new facility, which is the first building to be built in a one-million square foot complex being erected by AiResearch's parent organization, The Garrett Corp.

THE GARRETT Corp. is a

diversified organization of sprawling interests, each of which have made a heavy contribution to the development of Aviation in the United States.

President of one of Torrance's newest industrial firms is J. C. "Cliff" Garrett, who heads up eight divisions and two subsidiaries of the company which bears his name. Total employment is 10,000 and annual sales are slightly less than \$225,000,000.

Growth of the AiResearch Manufacturing Division, which employs 4500, with 80 per cent

living in the South Bay cities, began 21 years ago, in 1939.

GARRETT, then head of a small Los Angeles aircraft supply firm, was engaged in dinner talk with some Boeing Aircraft engineers. Together, they were expounding the possibility of pressurized flight for all commercial aircraft, predicting it was 20 years away.

From an austere operation in a garage in Hollywood, AiResearch grew and now is considered the leader in air conditioning and pressurization of aircraft and space vehicles.

TODAY'S planes, like the new Boeing 707 jet transport, are fully equipped with AiResearch products which can maintain a comfortable 5000 foot altitude for passengers while the plane is flying at 30,000 to 40,000 feet. The Lockheed Electra and the Caravelle are similarly equipped, and to a somewhat lesser extent, so are the Douglas DC-8 and the Convair 880.

Recently, AiResearch was given the ultimate recognition in its field. It is supplying the air conditioning and pressurization systems for Project Mer-

WITH expansion in sales came expansion in facilities. Presently AiResearch occupies 13 outside locations located throughout Southern California area. On its 66-acre site in Torrance it hopes to consolidate some of these facilities and ultimately operate two units — the present one at Century and Sepulveda Boulevards and the Torrance complex at 190th and Crenshaw.
