New Physics for General Public Offered

Presentation of new course in physics for the general public rather than for science and engineering majors will be made at El Camino College for the first time this fall semester.

"This course is unlike any ordinary course in physics," William T. Mooney Jr., assistant director of instruction, explained. "It might well be called Physics for People, for this is precisely its intent. It is intended for those who have neither the background nor the interest nor the need nor the mathematical background for the ordinary physics course," Mooney elaborated.

"The establishment of this course is in recognition of the fact that physics is all around us. It is not found just in a physics book. Physics is in the home, in the kitchen, on the highway, and in the sky. Physics tells us how birds fly, why rain drops are round, and why the flag flutters in the wind.

This new course will explore these things and many others like them in a descriptive way," the administrator said.

Since the body of knowledge called "physics" has been put together by people, the students in the new course will explore biographically and historically the men who made

physics. Students will become acquainted with Archimedes, Galileo, Newton, Kepler, Copernicus, and scores of others and their contributions to physics and present-day culture.

Since science has been defined as asking questions of nature and interpreting these answers, a vast array of lecture experiments will be used to keep this philosophy constantly in mind. The interpretation of how nature behaves will be on a purely descriptive basis with only a hint at the mathematics.

All who wish to know something of the world of physics

are invited to enroll in this course. Elementary school and secondary teachers will find the course of particular interest.

The instructor for Physics 11 this semester will be Julius Sumner Miller, a member of the faculty who has been engaged by CBS Television Network for a new series entitled "Great Events in Science." Miller has done, over the past several years, the CBS show, "Why Is It So?"

Physics 11 will be offered on Monday and Wednesday evenings from 6:30 to 8 p.m. Students may inquire in the regis-
