

# Schools Report Absentee Ballot Information

Absentee ballots for the Tuesday, Oct. 11, tax override election in Torrance can be obtained by writing for them, according to school officials.

Persons who will be unable to go to the polls on that day may get applications for the ballots at the Torrance Schools' Department of Special Services. Applications will then be sent to the county superintendent's office, which will then mail an absentee ballot. These ballots must be sent back to the county between Sept. 21 and Oct. 5.

They will be counted with the other ballots cast in the election.

In the election, voters will decide whether to authorize raising the operating tax ceiling for Torrance schools by 50 cents. Although the district is still growing, it has reached a tax ceiling.

# Residents to Ask for New Curbs, Walks

Residents of the 23000 block on Park St. are circulating a petition to be presented to the city council asking for curbs and sidewalks in this area, according to Earl Smith, who owns property there.

The petition, now having one-third of the necessary 60 signatures, is based on the "Improvement Act of 1911" and requests installation of 8-inch curbs, 23-inch gutters, 10-foot parkways and four-foot sidewalks, Smith said, adding that most of the property owners hoped that existing trees would be allowed to remain.
