The "Back to School" night program titled "Focus on the Classroom" will start in the THS auditorium at 7:30 p.m.


Tuesday, Nov. 1, 1960. Refreshments will be served in the cafeteria at the conclusion of the evening's activities.

NATION'S OLDEST ARMED FORCE,
MARINE CORPS, NEAR 185th YEAR

One hundred and eighty-five years can change a lot of things but the United States Marine Corps has remained constant down through the years as these lines from their hymn indicate. "From the halls of Montezuma to the shores of Tripoli. We will fight our country's battles on the land and on the sea."

The oldest branch of the armed forces of the United States will celebrate its 185th birthday Nov. 10. That the Marine Corps has played a major part in defending this country in every battle, from major wars to quelling uprisings that amounted to little more than boot camp training skirmishes, is not only history, but tradition.

SAYINGS SUCH as "Retreat, hell, we just got here," from World War I, and John Basilone's, "Now I'll have to go out and earn this," when awarded the medal of honor for action on Guadalcanal, have not only become tradition in the Corps, but legend to all men.

The United States Marine Corps is the nation's amphibious force-in-readiness and is one of two military services within the Department of the Navy. The missions of the Corps is to provide Fleet, Marine Forces of combined arms, together with supporting air components, for the seizure or defense of advanced naval bases.

TO DEVELOP, in coordination with the Army and Air Force, amphibious operations

pertaining to landing equipment and forces. To provide ships' detachments for the Navy, security at naval stations, and to perform such other duties as the President may direct, as stated in the National Security Act of 1947.

On the local front the duties of Marines stationed here are to assist men and women who would enlist in the Marine Corps. One of the men assigned to this duty in Torrance is S/Sgt. Ernest P. Hayes and the past 20 years have changed him from a 19-year-old "boot" weighing 127 pounds to a veteran of both combat and peacetime duty now tipping the scales at 175 pounds.

S/SGT. HAYES was cited in the History of World War II, by Fletcher Knebel, for his efforts in going to the rescue of Lt. Col. L. Wilson, who had been hit by a machine gun bullet. This was during Third Division's action in the assault

on the Island of Guam.

Hayes has re-enlisted twice since World War II. He came back to duty during the Korean conflict, and after a business venture as a civilian, to serve as an accident and criminal investigator. Then to his present assignment as a South Bay Recruiting Station non-commissioned officer.

WHEN interviewed, Hayes said that peacetime Marines are either training, or being trained. He outlined the educational and vocational advantages for recruits who wish to complete their educations, or learn a trade, while serving their enlistments.

He also pointed out the advantages of Naval aviation schools and the overseas rotation service which allows Marines duty at Formosa, Hong Kong, Japan, and the Hawaiian Islands while serving with the Third Division stationed on Okinawa.
