


"What in your opinion, is the most important issue of the 1960 presidential campaign?"


Mrs. Lydia Montejano, 20814 S. Western Ave. housewife.

Police Chase Two Drivers, One Escapes

A total of eight traffic counts were lodged against a Los Angeles shipping clerk here yesterday after he was curbed in a high-speed chase through residential districts which reached speeds approaching 95 miles an hour.

Jailed on the several charges was Orrie K. Elliott Jr., who was arrested by officers Jim Popp and Bob Dunn after his car and another had been pursued by the two officers.

POP AND DUNN took up the chase near Del Amo Blvd. and Arlington Ave. after police were told that a major disturbance was under way in the area.

Spotting two cars racing at high speed northbound on Arlington the officers whipped their pursuit car around and gave chase.

Approaching 190th St., the two vehicles turned off lights, raced through the flashing red light and continued to 182nd St. where one car turned off.

Candidate to Woo Voters of Southwest

A crowd estimated to total more than 30,000 persons is expected to greet Senator John Kennedy at the South Bay Shopping Center Tuesday afternoon.

Kennedy, the Democratic candidate for president, will be winding up his California push Tuesday, appearing throughout the downtown area of Los Angeles during the morning, motoring to the South Bay Center for a 2:30 appearance, and then going to the Long Beach Douglas plant to meet workers as the day shift ends.

In the evening he will make a major talk in East Los Angeles to climax his Southland swing.

Bottleneck On Sepulveda To Be Ended

Plans and specifications for the widening and improvement of Sepulveda Blvd. between Figueroa and Main Sts. in Carson have been approved by County Supervisor Burton W. Chace.

"East-west traffic on this portion of Sepulveda becomes extremely congested during peak hours," Chace said, "and I am extremely happy to see this improvement go forward."

BIDS FOR this contract, designed by the Los Angeles County Road Department, will be opened by the Supervisors on Nov. 22nd.

The improvement, approximately one-half mile in length will consist of reconstruction to alleviate critical structural deficiencies, and widening to four lanes to accommodate present and future traffic demands.

This segment of Sepulveda, a major County highway, presently carries 14,000 vehicles daily.

CHACE SAID completion of this major project will not only be an important step toward ultimate development of this major east-west road, but is also intended to furnish improved access to the proposed Harbor Freeway. The portion of Sepulveda between Vermont Ave. and Figueroa St. will be improved by the State Division of Highways in conjunction with the Freeway construction.

Brown Flays MWD Stand On Prop. 1

An "obstructionist minority" of Metropolitan Water District directors is attempting to scuttle a water program that will benefit millions in California, Gov. Brown said here before a meeting of the Inter-City Mayors and Councilmen of the area Thursday night.

Lashing out at Joseph Jensen, MWD director, Brown said the Southland water official had a "long-hidden hostility to the whole State Water Plan."

IN VOTING against the Feather River water delivery contract and by refusing to endorse Prop. 1, the \$1.75-billion water bond issue, the MWD directors "gave way to the bias

and the demonstrated bad faith of Jensen," Brown said.

Opposition of the MWD officials, however, has not blunted Brown's enthusiasm for what he called a program started in the administration of Earl Warren, carried forward under Goodwin Knight, and given legislative approval under the current administration.

"WE'LL STILL win it on Nov. 8," he told newsmen before the formal meeting at the Push Horse Thursday night. He pointed to encouraging support from strong northern California forces which should assure passage of the proposal.
